## **Technical Competencies**

For each competency, use the letter X to indicate whether each competency can be taught and evaluated on the job.

Number	Technical Competencies of the Occupation Pathway
□1	Answer patient call signals, signal lights, bells, or intercom systems to determine patients' needs.
□ 2	Turn or reposition patients with limited mobility.
□ 3	Provide physical support to assist patients to perform daily living activities, such as getting out of bed, bathing, mouth care, dressing, skin care, toileting, standing, walking, or exercising.
□ 4	Review patients' dietary restrictions, food allergies, and preferences to ensure patient receives appropriate diet.
□ 5	Measure and record food and liquid intake or urinary and fecal output, reporting changes to medical or nursing staff
□ 6	Record vital signs, such as temperature, blood pressure, pulse, oxygen level or respiration rate, as directed by medical or nursing staff.
□ 7	Gather information from caregivers, nurses, or physicians about patient condition, treatment plans, or appropriate activities.
□ 8	Observe or examine patients to detect symptoms that may require medical attention, such as bruises, open wounds, or blood in urine.
□ 9	Document or otherwise report observations of patient behavior, complaints, or physical symptoms to nurses.
□ 10	Remind patients to take medications or nutritional supplements.
□ 11	Feed patients or assist patients to eat or drink and document intake.



□ 12	Supply, collect, or empty bedpans and document output.
□ 13	Undress, wash, and dress patients who are unable to do so for themselves.
□ 14	Lift or assist others to lift patients to move them, using proper lift and transfer techniques, including a gait belt as needed.
□ 15	Communicate with patients to ascertain feelings or need for assistance or social and emotional support.
□ 16	Prepare or serve food trays.
□ 17	Clean and sanitize patient rooms, bathrooms, examination rooms, or other patient areas
□ 18	Record height or weight of patients.
□ 19	Collect specimens, such as urine, feces, or sputum.

□ 25	Assist nurses or physicians in the operation of medical equipment or provision of patient care.
□ 26	Administer medications or treatments, such as catheterizations, suppositories, irrigations, enemas, massages, or douches, as directed by a physician or nurse.
□ 27	Position or hold patients in position for procedures.
□ 28	Transport patients to activities, treatment units, testing units, other areas, using wheelchairs, stretchers, or moveable beds
□ 29	Provide information such as directions, visiting hours, or patient status information to visitors or callers
□ 30	Transport specimens, laboratory items, or pharmacy items, ensuring proper documentation and delivery to authorized personnel
□ 31	Set up treating or testing equipment, such as oxygen tents, portable radiograph (x-ray) equipment, or overhead irrigation bottles, as directed by a physician or nurse
□ 32	Explain medical instructions to patients or family members.
□ 33	Stock or issue medical supplies, such as dressing packs or treatment trays.
□ 34	Understand and follow all policies and procedures for Infection control, abuse and neglect, HIPPA, resident rights, etc.
□ 35	Care for and assist with hearing aids, eyeglasses, dentures, and adaptive equipment.
□ 36	Appropriately communicate with residents, including those who are cognitively impaired or mentally ill.
□ 37	Give proper care for the terminally ill and provide post mortem care.



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
